



This is a picture of John Hurt playing the part of a disfigured man, John Merrick, in a famous movie called *The Elephant Man*.

Synopsis: Merrick is a gentle man. He would never hurt anybody. The people point and laugh, however, at his ugliness.

There is a man that wants to show him off in freak shows. This man does it for the money, not caring about John's feelings.

"I am not an animal! I am a human being! I... am... a man!" -John Merrick

This is the only line in the film in which John Merrick actually speaks out in his own defence.

Finding Humour is not about using humour antagonistically and laughing at others' misfortune, injuries, disfigurement and vulgarities etc.

We use humour to raise spirits; of others and of ourselves.

Ahmad (looking scared): Eh! I'm joking!

Muthu: Anytime chopstick! Chicken head! Cluck! Cluck! Cluck! Cluck!

Ahmad and Ah Seng get into fistfight and the whole party is spoiled.

What it looks like

- Looks for humour and absurdity in appropriate situations
- Does not take one's self too seriously
- Generate and collects humorous stories to tell others
- Does not find humour in the wrong places such as human differences, vulgarity, violence etc.

What it sounds like

- Jokes about errors and pokes fun at one's self
- Laughs at one's self as well as others in funny situations
- Verbally playful when interacting with others
